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Located in East Hampton, New York, Ross School was established in 1991 as an independent, coeducational day school.

Our mission is to change the way education meets the future: to foster interdisciplinary, integrated thinking and innovative leadership; to engage fully in the global community; and to facilitate lifelong learning. CURRICULUM

The Ross Spiral Curriculum follows the evolution of human consciousness and is taught chronologically through grades one to twelve as a dynamic system expanding in complexity. Classroom activities integrate the arts, science, literature, health and well-being, and technology. All Ross students are required to take grade-level Integrated Cultural History, English and Science that are specific to a time period. Advanced Coursework and other electives are taken in addition to the core, math, language and wellness and courses. Students generally enroll in eight to ten classes each term.

SENIOR PROJECT

The Senior Project is the culmination of a student's learning experiences at Ross School. Students embody their passions through a process and product that integrate multiple intelligences, cultural and historical context, personal reflection, and application of technology. Each Senior Project comprises a Process Folio, Final Product, and Presentation. A faculty mentor, acting as facilitator, teacher, advisor, editor, critic, and advocate, works individually with each student and is essential to the evolution and realization of the project.

INDEPENDENT STUDY

Ross students can elect to study an advanced course or an elective as an approved and supervised Independent Study. The student meets with a faculty member weekly to ensure the guidelines and goals are being met.

ADVANCED COURSEWORK

Ross School offers advanced classes that students can choose to take as either one or both of their electives. The coursework matches or exceeds the rigor of an Advanced Placement class. All advanced courses are taken in conjunction with our required grade-level history, English, and science courses. Students have the option to take AP exams.

STEAM CERTIFICATE

The Ross STEAM Innovation Certificate is awarded to those students who fulfill a rigorous program of coursework in the areas of science, math, technology, engineering, and art and design. Students engage in project-based learning that requires problem-solving and design thinking. Research opportunities to enhance readiness for college and careers in STEAM fields are available to students.

STEAM Certificate Requirements: Six STEAM related electives; two of the three offered choices must be fulfilled (Advanced Yearlong Math, Advanced Yearlong Science and/or SMART Robotics Certificate Program) accredited through Carnegie Mellon; and a STEAM-related two-term Senior Project and Junior Year six-week Modernity Project.



ROSS SCHOOL TENNIS ACADEMY (RSTA)

Ross School Tennis Academy (RSTA) offers an unusual and dynamic program for national and international junior players that combines an engaging, global curriculum with the highest level of competitive tennis training available. Designed for USTA/ITF players in grades 7–12 and postgraduates, RSTA combines academics with a complete physical and mental conditioning program. Students spend nineteen hours a week playing tennis and training.

ROSS SCHOOL ART ACADEMY (RSAA)

At RSAA, students develop their artistic portfolios in an active art community of peers as they learn and develop their own individual "artistic voices" in a broad range of media. RSAA students usually complete one or more College Board Advanced Placement (AP) Studio Art Exams (AP 2-D, Drawing, and 3-D portfolio exams.) While at RSAA students also have the opportunity to work with local artists, clubs, galleries, museums, NAEA, and the greater art community around us.

FIELD ACADEMY

Field Academy is three-week mini-term for students in grades 7–12 to focus intensively on content of interest to them. Classes and programs in a wide variety of subjects expose students to in-depth study, new interests, possible college/career paths, and volunteer opportunities. Many courses feature travel both abroad and within the United States. Field Academy courses often form the basis for continued study, expand into a Senior Project, or provide an impetus for fundraising or other service efforts.

EXTRACURRICULAR AND COCURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Ross School offers an athletic program comprising both intramural and interscholastic athletics, with competitions occurring within Suffolk County Section XI in the following sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, sailing, soccer, softball, tennis, track, and volleyball. The school also supports active programs in media studies, visual and performing arts, math team, Model UN, and student government, among other topics.

ESOL PROGRAM

Ross School's English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) program teaches subject-matter content and language skills simultaneously in an authentic context at three levels. Within the Prep level, novice English learners develop reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills in content-based courses while practicing learning and classroom participation strategies. Courses at the Transition level provide opportunities for students to improve their research and analytical skills. Advanced ESOL workshops help students recognize finer shades of meaning in complex language and communicate their understanding in precise writing and speaking.

ACCREDITATION

Ross School is accredited by the Middle States Association Commissions on Elementary and Secondary Schools (MSA-CESS) and the New York State Association of Independent Schools (NYSAIS). Ross School is also recognized as a Program of Distinction in Global Literacies by MSA-CESS. Ross School is a member of the National Association of Independent Schools and the Association of Boarding Schools.

COVID-19 RESPONSE

In March 2020 Ross School pivoted to online instruction for the remainder of the academic year. In the 2020–2021 school year, students attended classes in person and/or remotely. Many international students worked remotely and asynchronously. All courses were taught via Zoom, and students on campus attended Zoom classes within small pods. Students were only able to take one elective instead of two, which limited the number of advanced courses that they could take. All extracurricular activities and Field Academy were canceled. The Ross Tennis Academy remained open as a modified program. In the 2021–2022 school year, in-person classes resumed as did a modified Field Academy and sports program. Some clubs were brought back in the 2022–2023 year with additional clubs added for the 2023-2024 school year.
